

COVID 19 Pandemic . . . As always, use common sense.

Guidelines for Parishes upon Resumption of Public Services

Churches are open for public celebration of the Divine Services, where it is permissible, with safety guidelines outlined below:

- Social distancing of 6 feet must be maintained:
 - while seating or standing in the pews – between non-family member
 - while standing in line for Communion and returning to the pew
- People are encouraged to wear face masks.
- Veneration of icons, etc. should be done without touching or kissing them.
- There will not be any coffee and snack follow Liturgy until further notice.
- Parishioners should be reminded that if they are not feeling well that they should stay at home and reminded that they are not bound by the Sunday obligation if they are ill.
- When receiving Communion, open your mouths wide, do not touch the spoon and do not cough or sneeze upon it. Each communicant will receive Eucharist from an unused spoon.
- Collection basket will be on a table so that parishioners may leave their offerings.
- Sacrament of Penance must be administered in safe space with keeping social distance.

Please consider other precautionary measures! As always, use common sense.

Pentecost - Pentecost is the completion of the mission of Christ. Pentecost is the most overlooked Holy Day in the world. The world puts most of the importance on the birth of Christ. It was celebrated for 12 days from December 24th to January 6th. Now many celebrate from Thanksgiving to New Year's Day. Pascha is celebrated by most from Holy Thursday to Easter Sunday, Christ's suffering, death and resurrection. There is more to the story, but our world ends it there. The world never mentions Pentecost. Pentecost is the completion of Christ's mission with the revelation of the Trinity. On this day, we are given the Holy Spirit, without which, Christ's mission would never be fulfilled. Throughout the Bible, we are given glimpses of the Trinity; from the beginning of Genesis to Abraham's visitors to the baptism of Christ and His transfiguration on Mt. Tabor. It must be noted that the feast of Pentecost is not simply the celebration of an event which took place centuries ago. It is the celebration of what must happen and does happen to us in the Church today. We all have died and risen with the Messiah-King, and we all have received his Most Holy Spirit. We are the "temples of the Holy Spirit." God's Spirit dwells in us. We, by our own membership in the Church, have received "the seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit" in the sacrament of chrismation. Pentecost has happened to us. We have received the Holy Spirit. The Divine Liturgy of Pentecost recalls our baptism into Christ. The kontakion sings of the reversal of Babel as God unites the nations into the unity of his Spirit. When the Most High came down and confused the tongues, He parted the nations. When He divided the tongues of fire, He called all to unity; thus with one voice we glorify the all Holy Spirit. The troparion proclaims the gathering of the whole universe into God's net through the work of the inspired apostles. The hymns "O Heavenly King" and "We have seen the True Light" are sung for the first time since Easter, calling the Holy Spirit to "come and abide in us," and proclaiming that "we have received the heavenly Spirit." The church building is decorated with green leaves of the summer to show that God's divine Breath comes to renew all creation as the "life-creating Spirit. Come, Holy Spirit, King of the Heavens be thou the light of my very soul. Fill up my being; instill within me, a heart made pure, renewed, and made whole.
