Know Your Church . . . Laity Formation **Respect of Life Month**

Although Catholics are called to cherish, protect and defend human life all year long, the Catholic Church in the United States traditionally sets aside each October as Respect Life Month. In *the encyclical, "Evangelium Vitae"* ("The Gospel of Life"), written by Pope St. John Paul II, is a prophetic document passionately reaffirmed the Church's constant teaching on the value and sacredness of every human life. It remains a foundational text for all our efforts to ensure that the life of every human person is protected and cherished.

The history of Respect Life Month dates back to 1972, when the U.S. bishops started a respect life program in October, in anticipation of the Roe vs. Wade decision by the U.S. Supreme Court in January 1973. By law, the U.S. Supreme Court's term begins on the first Monday of October.

October is Respect Life Month. At the core of Catholic teaching is respecting and honoring the dignity of every human being, from conception until natural death, and everything in between. This teaching animates everything we do at Catholic Charities, starting with counseling for women experiencing a crisis pregnancy; working with families who are seeking to adopt; conducting prenatal nurturing and childbirth classes; offering Love & Logic classes for parents; working with immigrants on their legal path to citizenship or residency; providing a path for people to become employed and stable; working with anyone in need on their path to stability and security; and so much more. The consistent life ethic underpins our work with people in all stages of their journey.

This month we ask for prayers for our brothers and sisters who are experiencing crisis impacting the quality of life; for unborn children and pregnant moms; for people who have no relationships, family or support systems; for immigrants fleeing violence and searching for a new beginning; for families working to escape the confines of poverty; and for anyone who has lost hope. At the center of all of this work is the human being God made in His own image, and an acknowledgment of the importance of individual attention and relationship, so that the real work of transformation can take place.
