Divine Liturgy Part 1

The most fundamental of Christian church services, the Divine Liturgy symbolically commemorates the earthly life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Divine Liturgy of Saint John Chrysostom is the most commonly used and is celebrated on Sundays and weekdays.
