St. James

The Holy Apostle James son of Alphaeus was one of the Twelve, a witness of the true words and miracles of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. He witnessed His passion, resurrection, and ascension. After the Descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, it fell to James to preach the Gospel to Eleutheropolis and the surrounding area. He suffered in Egypt in the town of Ostracina, being crucified by the pagans. Very little is known about this James, except that he was called to be an Apostle. Even so, we can take courage that even if we are not well known, our callings can be sure, God-honoring, but not many will know our names on earth. We will not be on billboards, in Time, or in the headlines. We serve quietly in our homes and neighborhoods, and die relatively unnoticed, but God notices us. Just like James reminds us, God uses a different set of standards to choose His heroes. God honors faithfulness, endurance, obedience, and sacrifice. Our responsibility is obedience and our own quiet faithfulness. As we know, some Apostles wrote books of the Bible and others are featured prominently in the gospels, James was quietly faithful to the Lord, and for that, he will be equally honored with them for all eternity.
